Angry with God! Jonah 4:1-11

Introduction

I Jonah's Heart Revealed

- A. Jonah vented his displeasure Jam 1:19-20
 - 1. His displeasure led to anger
 - a. He had little self-control Prov 25:28; 29:11
 - b. He had little fear of God Prov 8:13
 - c. He had little concern for the lost Lk 9:51-56
 - 2. His anger led to a carnal prayer Eph 4:26-27
- B. Jonah's grounds for anger
 - 1. The character of God Ex 34:6-7
 - 2. The mercy of God Matt 20:11; Lk 15:28
 - a. He relented from sending calamity Jon 3:10
- C. Jonah's anger led to self-pity
 - 1. He preferred death to life 1 Ki 19:3-4

II God Replied To Jonah's Anger

- A. He asked Jonah a question Eph 2:1-5
 - 1. "Do you have a right to be angry?" Lk15; Mt 18
 - 2. Jonah responded with sullen anger
- B. He gave Jonah an object lesson
 - 1. God provided a vine to comfort Jonah
 - 2. God provided a worm destroy the vine
 - 3. God provided a scorching heat Rev 3:19; 16:8-9
- C. Jonah's response to the lesson
 - 1. He wanted to die!

III God Replied Again to Jonah's Anger

- A. He asked Jonah another question
 - 1. "Do you have a right to be angry about the vine?"
 - 2. Jonah responded with irrational rage
 - a. "I do have a right to be angry!"
 - b. "I am angry enough to die!" Eccl 7:9
- B. He gave Jonah the conclusion of the lesson
 - 1. Jonah was concerned about a vine

- a. The lost comfort it gave him
- b. The lost protection it gave him
- c. The lost joy it gave him
- 2. God was concerned about the city of Nineveh
 - a. 120,000 Ninevites 2 Pet 3:9
 - b. Many cattle as well Ps 36:6; 145:9

PERSONAL APPLICATION

Take some time this week to consider the following:

- 1. Have you ever been angry with God? What were the circumstances? How did you justify your anger?
- 2. How do you normally respond when things don't "go your way"? What consequences usually result? How could you respond in a more biblical way in the future?
- 3. Jonah is a story of God's love and compassion for believers and unbelievers. Is there someone or a group of people that you have been spiritually calloused to (not caring whether they go to hell)? What would God have you do? Are you willing?
- 4. Read Matt 7:2. What kind of "measure" do you generally use to judge others? Critical/demanding or merciful/compassionate? Based on this verse, how then will God judge you?
- 5. What was God trying to teach Jonah through the plant, the worm and the scorching heat? Did he learn the lesson? Why/why not? How can you apply these lessons to your life?
- 6. Summarize the most important lessons you have learned from the study of Jonah? What will you do with these lessons?

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
